Sycamore Island Accomplishments for 2019

Reported by President, Richard Bertaut, Dec. 31, 2019

The members, with the leadership of Supervisors and Officers, and the ongoing proactive initiative by and services of Caretaker Joe Hage, have accomplished a number of major improvements this year. Parallel with this is the ongoing enjoyment and maintenance of the Island by our members. In this, my third and final year as President, I am pleased to report the following accomplishments for 2019:

- 1. Replacement of the 20 year old member database and club web presence, through migration to a contemporary system hosted by the respected provider Club Express. Special thanks to the initiative and hard work of Sherry Fizdale.
- 2. Revised the requirements for Senior Membership to "the rule of 85," with leadership from Anne Waidmann.
- 3. Revised timetable for membership application period from three to one month, with the initiative of Anne Waidmann.
- 4. Improved the club's release of liability waivers and associated procedures, under the leadership of Rebecca Beynon.
- 5. Ferry sign-in form improvements, monitoring and data collection of island usage, thanks to Madeleine Carter.
- 6. Authorized the purchase of new sturdy composite Adirondack chairs, following the initiative and research conducted by Phil Goldberg.
- 7. Installed emergency resuscitation AED equipment in the club kitchen, with the leadership of Dan Jamieson and Jim Drew.
- 8. Replaced rotting siding on the Clubhouse, including installing new insulation on the outside, with precise workmanship and surface and color matching by Joe Hage.

- 9. Re-screened first floor, led by Tove Elfstrom, Roman Kulbashny and Joe Hage.
- 10. Accepted paddle board donations, and Mark Friedrichs arranged the purchase of paddles.
- 11. The renovation of our club archives facility in the Carnegie Library was completed and opened to the public. Visits can be made by reservation. Karen Possner was instrumental in organizing our materials and coordinating with archives staff.
- 12. Began reconstruction of canoe shed that was damaged by a falling tree in 2018. Karl Kosok and John Noble are leading this effort.
- 13. Approved in the 2020 Budget improved Caretaker compensation to reflect the wide scope of his responsibilities and leadership. Initiative by Madeleine Carter and Anne Marie Cunningham.
- 14. Acquisition and installation of new Clubhouse furniture. Purchase initiated by Karen Possner and the transportation to the island and assembling of all pieces was performed by a wonderful team of volunteers.

Attention all Members: Website Migration

As you have heard, the club is migrating from our existing web site at Sycamorelsland.org to a new web site, at Sycamorelsland.ClubExpress.com. All members should have received an email "Welcome" message from Club Express, giving then access to the new site, and providing them with their username and initial password. Please take the time now to log in to your new account and to make any changes to your information that are necessary. You will be able to change your password, and even your username if you wish. You can also add family members' emails to your account, so that they will also receive emails from the club.

One of the great new advantages is the quick customer support by the Club Express tech support staff. Feel free to contact them with any questions or issues in using the new system. They also have comprehensive help documentation available on the site.

The new web site will have two distinct sections: a "front page" that will be visible to the world, with general information about the club, its history and our application procedures; and a members only area (accessible by signing in) that will serve as our main club communications channel, and be the place for members to pay their fees and renewals each year.

We are also *looking for members and waitlisters as volunteers* to help with posting island photos, notices, and other useful information on this new site. Don't worry, no HTML experience is necessary and the Club Express platform is relatively easy to navigate. We can give volunteers access to subsections of the site, where they can post information about upcoming events, start discussion groups about club projects, and help us to transfer the many levels of club information from the old site to the new.

We expect that it will take several months for the new site to include the wealth of information from the current site. Please be patient with this transition as your volunteer officers work to integrate the new system and improve our workflows. And again, additional volunteers will expedite this process, so please sign up to help with this migration effort!


Not much beaver activity lately. I guess they are satisfied with the amount of provisional trees that they have collected.

November minutes were approved.

Caretaker's report: Joe Hage reported that because of considerable beaver activity, he has added wire around trees. Karen Posner, Stan Wiggins, and Jim Drew have also helped in this effort. Islanders are encouraged to wrap the trees Joe has marked and can charge any wire purchased to the club. Water is still on and bathrooms were operating for the December music performances.



Membership: Anne Waidmann introduced three new families, who were voted in to membership: James Landfield; Tom Holmberg and Allsion Southall; and Sierra Casillas and Tom Driggs. Fifteen places are now open for the 2020 lottery, and more are expected as dues renewal comes in. Applications for the lottery will be accepted only in January and can now be downloaded from the website. Membership status currently: regular 162; senior 84; inactive 19; honorary 16; wait list 48.

Entertainment: Following the successful music performances this month, John Butler intends to schedule events for late March or April, late summer, and winter 2020. He thanked George and Shelly Malusky for cooking for the work fest and for the downriver race.

Archivist report: Karen Posner needs any club documents for the DC Archives by December 31. In addition to Islander newsletters, these include financial, membership, and any documents of historical significance (anything that needs to be memorialized). Karen receives receipts for items the club gives the Archives, which then retains them as theirs.

Nominating committee: John Noble proposed the slate of officers and supervisors for 2020, which was unanimously approved. Members also suggested an honorary membership for Tryon Wells, in thanks for his years of service to the club.

Web development/web transition: Richard Bertaut explained that club members must register by December 31 to receive email blasts. All have received an initial email introducing the new system, Club Express, and outlining how to set up an account. The advantages of the new site are that notices can be sent out quickly; dues and payments tracking will be easier; and dues can be paid through the portal (online) with Discover, Visa, or Mastercard. No dues letters will be sent by mail; dues will not be raised in 2020. Each family will have one account, even with multiple email addresses. For three months the club will have both old and new sites. Then, in March, the old site will point to the new one. Anyone interested in building the website is welcome to participate.

Treasurer's report: Florian Kogelnik related that in 2019, the club budgeted \$92,000 but spent \$87,000, the largest expenses being the shed, supplies, and chairs, with less for insurance this year. Costs will likely stay the same in 2020, and the budget for that year was unanimously approved. Members thanked Florian for his work.

New business: Because of low turnout for the fall work fest (43 versus highs of over 70), a suggestion was made to have fixed dates each year for the work fests. But variable weather, especially flooding, may make this impossible. Another factor in the low turnout was the late email blast, which should be remedied by the new website.

The meeting adjourned with thanks to Vicki Judson for again hosting the holiday party and to Richard Bertaut for serving as President of the Club for the last three years.
